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PROCEEDINGS

(Recording of the meeting began at 3:31 p.m.)

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Good afternoon, everyone.
We're ready to get started. We're just going to give
Vivianne a minute to get up the agenda. Perfect.

I want to welcome all of you today to the program services and childhood health committee meeting. Today is Thursday, May 7th, and it's nice to see all of you via Zoom today. Welcome to everyone. Muriel do we have any public comments?

MS. JEANTY: I don't have any public comments,

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Okay, thank you. Then committee members, let's move on to the approval of the April 2nd, 2020 Program Services and Childhood Health Committee meeting minutes.

By now you will have all had an opportunity to review the minutes that was included inside of your packet. May I have a motion to approve the minutes, please?

MS. WELLER: So moved, Karen Weller.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: And a second?

MR. BAGNER: Second, Bagner.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. All those in

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1 ALL: Aye.

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MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Opposed? The minutes are approved. We're moving now into resolutions. We have eight resolutions for your consideration today.

Before we start, I'm going to punt to Imran for a few

MR. ALI: Okay. Many of these resolutions have a list of providers and I know some board members may be aligned to them, but in-kind services, some kind of collaboration.

And our attorneys and I have been speaking, and I consulted with the Commission of Ethics and what they advised me to do is that if any one of you --

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: You're welcome.

MR. ALI: -- have any kind of association with any of the organizations listed in the resolutions that you should recuse yourself.

They are doing some research right now to determine a way forward, but according to Jose who is the director of the Commissioner of Ethics, he recommended that you just recuse until a final decision is made.

So with that said, if you see any organization on the list of providers in any of the resos, or you have any affiliation to it in any way, I would

recommend that you recuse yourself at this point.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Imran, would that include being a board member, because in the past as a board member for the Florida Reading Corps, I was advised a couple years ago that I did not need to recuse. I'm no longer a member of that board. I am a member of the Concerned African Women's Board.

MR. ALI: Yeah. If you are a member of the board, you should be recusing, yeah.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Okay. So, I'm not sure. I know it came up in one of the reso's. So, I'll be punting to -- shall I punt to Karen for --

MR. ALI: Please.

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MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: I'm going to need to take a look through. I know that there was one resolution that specifically mentioned -- actually, I have that in my note bear with me, I'm working off of a screen and an iPad here. I have no written notes today. So that would be -- let's see. Could I have some -- can staff help me out with the resolution that mentioned --

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Got it. Thank you. So Karen, for 2020-C, I'll be punting to you. Okay so

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MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Let us begin. Resolution 2020-A.

MS. HANSON: They also have one in "A?" I think they have a family neighborhood partnership.

MS. SYLVESTRE: Yes. Yes, they do.

MR. MANNING: Can we ask -- can I ask -- I'm sorry. Can I ask that when we read the resolutions just to confirm the various agencies that are served? That they be listed very quickly, so we would all know for sure?

MS. BOHORQUES: I can go to that page of the resolution during -- when it's being read, yes.

MR. MANNING: Okay. Thank you.

MS. BOHORQUES: Sure.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: So, we're going to --

MR. BAGNER: And just to clarify -- can I just clarify? So, that means if there's any affiliation, even if in kind contribution that would also -- we should be recusing ourselves?

MR. ALI: Yes, Dan. That's what they recommend at this point. According to them, the trust has the highest standards of the perception of conflict of interest and so they recommend we do that until they come up with some formal recommendation, so they just

1 | gave me that advice.

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MR. BAGNER: Okay. Thank you, Imran.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Do we want to read the -there's four -- there are -- for the first resolution
there were 14. The second there are 8 and the third
there were 40. Based on Frank's requests, do we want
to read the fundees at the beginning prior to reading
the resolution?

MR. HAJ: Pam, we -- as Vivianne stated, we can display it on the screen.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Perfect. Okay.

MR. MANNING: That's fine. If we can see it on screen, that will be great.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: So Karen, I'm punting to you for the first resolution which is 2020-A and then the third which is "C."

MS. WELLER: Okay. Can everybody hear me? All right, Resolution 2020-A. Authorization to negotiate and execute a contract renewals with 14 Family and Neighborhood Support Partnership providers identified herein in the total amount not to exceed \$10,317,283 dollars for a term of 14 months, commencing August 1st, 2020 and ending September 30th, 2021. May I have a motion?

MS. DONWORTH: So moved, Donworth.

MS. WELLER: And a second? 1 2. MS. LEICHTER: Second, Leichter. 3 MS. WELLER: And any recusals? MR. BAGNER: Recusal, Bagner. Employed by FIU 4 5 as a subcontractor for Americans for Immigrant 6 Justice. 7 MS. WELLER: Okay. MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Recused, Hollingsworth. I'm 8 affiliated with Concerned African Women. 9 10 MS. WELLER: Okay. Any discussion? 11 MR. HAJ: Karen, we have a --12 MS. KOBRINSKI: Pardon me. 13 MR. HAJ: Karen, we have a couple more. 14 MS. WELLER: Yeah, we have more recusals. 15 MR. HAJ: There are more recusals, Karen. 16 MS. WELLER: Okay. I'm sorry. 17 MR. HAJ: I can go through the list. Tiombe, 18 are you on the phone? MS. JEANTY: No, she's not -- she's connected 19 20 yet. 21 MR. HAJ: Okay. Dr. Bendross-Mindigall? 22 MS. JEANTY: No. 23 MR. HAJ: Dr. Bagner, Richard Dunn? 24 PASTOR DUNN: I'm on the line, yes. 25 MR. HAJ: You would have to recuse on this one.

PASTOR DUNN: Okay. 1 So be it. 2. MR. HAJ: Gilda, Dr. Neiman and Dr. Jimenez-3 Herrera. MS. HERRERA: This is Dr. Jimenez-Herrera. 4 recuse myself. I work for MDC Miami-Dade College. 5 6 MR. MANNING: This is Frank. I see the 7 Department of Juvenile Justice listed, so I may have 8 to recuse as well. 9 MS. WELLER: Okay. Any more recusals? Okay. Discussion? No discussion? Then we'll move into 10 voting. All those in favor? 11 12 ALL: Aye. 13 MS. WELLER: Opposed? Okay, this resolution 14 carries. Pam, are you able to do the next one? 15 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Yes, ma'am. Thank you, 16 Karen. 17 MS. WELLER: Okay. 18 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Resolution 2020-B. Authorization -- Tiombe is here now. Tiombe's here. 19 20 Authorization to negotiate and execute -- Tiombe, 21 please mute your phone. Thank you. Resolution 2020-B. Authorization to negotiate 22 23 and execute contract renewals with eight providers 24 identified herein for Family Strengthening services in

a total amount not to exceed \$3,254,155 dollars for

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term of 12 months, commencing August 1st, 2020 and 1 2. ending July 31, 2021, and authorization to add two 3 additional 12-month renewals to align with the funding cycles for the broader parenting initiatives. May I 4 have a motion, please? 5 6 MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: So moved, Kendrick-Dunn. 7 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Tiombe. MR. HAJ: All right. Tiombe, you have to recuse 8 from this one. 9 10 MS. GIMENEZ: Moved, Gimenez. MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: Yes, you're right. Sorry 11 12 about that. 13 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Okay. And we got a first 14 from Gimenez. A second? 15 MS. LEICHTER: Second, Leichter. 16 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Marissa. And on 17 to recusals. PASTOR DUNN: Do I have to recuse from this one 18 as well? 19 20 MR. HAJ: Yes, sir. 21 PASTOR DUNN: So be it. 22 MR. BAGNER: Bagner, employed by FIU. MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: Kendrick-Dunn employed in 23 24 MDPS.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Further recusals? Okay.

Moving into discussion. I'll provide a quick overview. This is a contract renewal for eight providers and authorization for two additional months to synchronize funding cycles.

This is a cross -- this initiative is a cross-cutting funding approach that focuses on families with children and youth experiencing challenges such as disruptive child behavior, tumultuous parent child relationships, youth violence, and parent mental health and/or substance abuse issues.

It's an evidence based individualized parenting and clinical intervention approach that are accessible at the community and at the in-home environments to support families.

Now, do keep in mind that in response to the present and anticipated critical human service community needs resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic and its impact on Miami-Dade County, additional supports to families will be offered by the trained clinicians of the family strengthening initiative. Discussion for this resolution? Hearing none, all those in favor?

ALL: Aye.

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MS. KOBRINSKI: Can I ask a question?

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Yes. Somebody has a

1 question? 2. MS. KOBRINSKI: Can staff explain the additional 12-month renewals? 3 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: So, you're --4 MS. KOBRINSKI: This is the fifth and final year 5 and you're having two years? 6 7 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Staff, can -- do we have a staff member that can respond to the synchronizing 8 funding cycles? 9 10 MR. HAJ: Yes, Stephanie or Bevone. 11 MS. SYLVESTRE: Yes. So, we've made a decision 12 to put as many of our contracts as possible on our 13 fiscal year. Just -- it goes -- it makes it easier 14 for us to track fiscally and reconcile expenses, and 15 it makes it easier for closing our books. 16 And so, because these programs are not tied to 17 the school year and are done year-round, we thought it 18 made sense to align it to the fiscal year. So, by adding two additional months, what it will do is it 19 20 will allow us to align the contracts to the fiscal 21 year. 22 MS. BOHORQUES: Stephanie, this is about the years. I mean, cycles. 23 MS. HANSON: This is Lori. 24

MS. SYLVESTRE: I'm sorry. Say it again. This

is Stephanie.

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MS. HANSON: Stephanie, this is about the funding cycle, not the contract term. And I can step in because basically we're doing this for the family strengthening program because we see them as one end of the continuum of our broader parenting and family programs.

And those are -- we want to align the cycle so that when we put out the solicitation the next time, we'll bring together the universal parenting program along with the groups and individual programs that have been with us for the longest amount of time, as well as the deeper end family clinical supports that are in the family strengthening program.

We feel that that's a continuum of services that needs to be solicited all together. But each piece kind of came online, like the two ends, the universal and the family strengthening, came online at different points in time.

So we're just trying to align the funding cycles for the family strengthening one which started a few years ago and was put on a four-year cycle and it was a little behind the parenting cycle.

MS. KOBRINSKI: I understand. (Inaudible)

1 MS. GRAVES: Leigh, you're --2. MS. HANSON: Leigh, it's hard to hear you. MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Your audio is breaking up. 3 MS. GRAVES: Your audio is distorted. Try 4 turning the camera off and see if that helps. 5 MS. KOBRINSKI: All right. So, can you hear me 6 7 now? MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: It's not any better. 8 9 MS. HANSON: No. 10 MS. WELLER: What's the issue? 11 MS. KOBRINSKI: I'm going to try call in. 12 MS. GRAVES: The issue is whether you all need a 13 procurement waiver. So as it stands now, it seems 14 like this was on a four-year cycle and if that was bid 15 out on a four-year cycle or the five-year cycle, the 16 additional two years may be a violation of the 17 procurement policy without a waiver. 18 MS. HANSON: Okay. Well, that's the first we're -- we -- I think that we would have to -- that's the 19 20 first we're hearing of that. When we drafted this, we 21 tried to put those two actions that we knew were 22 needed together, so I guess we need to get your direction on what to do. 23 24 MS. GRAVES: What cycle was it bid under? Was

it before you went to the five-year cycle?

MS. HANSON: Correct. 1 2. MS. GRAVES: So now you're trying to extend it to align it with the five-year cycle. You'll need a 3 procurement waiver if it has not been bid out again. 4 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: How will that affect this 5 resolution? How will that affect the resolution? Do 6 7 we modify it now or will it have to go back to staff? MS. HANSON: Can we amend the resolution to add 8 9 the procurement waiver to it? 10 MS. GRAVES: Yes. 11 MS. HANSON: Right now? 12 MS. GRAVES: Yes. 13 MS. HANSON: So I guess we need an amendment. 14 MS. GRAVES: So it was moved by Gimenez and 15 seconded by Leichter. Someone's proposing -- staff is 16 proposing that the motion be amended to add the 17 procurement waiver for the alignment of the contract 18 cycle to the existing programs, strengthen -- Family 19 Strengthening Services to the five-year program cycle. 20 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Okay. May I have a motion, 21 please? 22 MS. GRAVES: Was the amendment accepted? 23 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Is -- does that require a vote? All those in favor? 24

MS. GRAVES: Just from the maker, Ms. Gimenez.

1 If she accepts it and Ms. Leichter accepts it, the 2. second, then it'll be moved as amended, and then just vote on the amended item. 3 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Okay. Do those that first 4 5 and seconded, approve the amendment? MS. GIMENEZ: Yes. 6 7 MS. LEICHTER: Yeah. Leichter, seconds again. MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Okay. Thank you very much. 8 All those in favor? 9 10 ALL: Aye. 11 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed? 12 MS. GRAVES: It's adopted as amended. 13 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Yes. Adopted as amended. 14 Thank you very much. And Karen, punting to you for 15 Resolution 2020-C, please. MS. WELLER: Okay. 16 17 MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: Wait, hold on. I'm sorry. 18 This is Tiombe. I know I had to recuse but I know I have to wait because I had a comment about -- for the 19 last resolution. So can I make the comment because I 2.0 21 don't have to wait until after. I was on a call. 22 I spoke with Stephanie yesterday. I just wanted 23 to say that I was very happy to see the language of 24 culturally informed. I know, usually, you know,

that's something is that I advocate strongly for.

And I think this is the first time I think I had mentioned to her that I've actually seen this language in one of the resolutions because culture, you know, acknowledging the cultures of the various families that we service is very important.

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And when you look at literature, you know, moving more toward recognizing people and their differences and their cultures and how that impacts, you know, how parents raise children, how they may respond to certain things.

But I was very happy to see that language. Very happy to see that there was language in there about not a one size fits all because that is where I think mental health and then other related services need to move towards because historically, it has been this one size fits all and this is supposed to work when there have clearly been issues in the past with research.

If you look at, you know, this research says this is going to work but then when you dig deeper into the research, it doesn't even address the populations that is being used for.

So I just wanted to say that to the staff that I was so excited you don't even have -- you don't even understand how excited I was to even see that, so I

1 see that as growth. So, I just wanted to mention 2. that. 3 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Tiombe. Back to you, Karen. 4 5 MS. WELLER: Okay. Resolution 2020-C. 6 Authorization to negotiate and execute contract 7 renewals with 40 providers identified herein to 8 deliver evidence-based parenting services in a total 9 amount not to exceed \$14,087,907 each for a term of 12 10 months commencing August the 1st of 2020 and ending 11 July 31st, 2021 with two remaining 12-month renewals 12 subject to annual funding appropriations. May I have 13 a motion? 14 MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: So moved, Kendrick-Dunn. 15 MS. WELLER: Okay. Second? PASTOR DUNN: Second, Richard Dunn. 16 17 MS. WELLER: Okay. 18 PASTOR DUNN: I love doing that. 19 MS. WELLER: Any recusals? 20 MR. BAGNER: Bag --21 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Hollingsworth. Go ahead, 22 Dan. 23 MR. BAGNER: Oh, go ahead. 24 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Recuse, Hollingsworth. 25 Concerned African Women.

MR. BAGNER: Recused, Bagner. Employed by FIU.

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MS. WELLER: Anyone else? Okay. Moving into discussion. With this particular resolution, this is the resolution that is dealing with evidence based and promising programs that include group advocacy, home visitation and individual supports.

These programs offer professional and peer support, educational and skill building opportunities for parents and primary caregivers in the prenatal period and through children's transitions to adulthood. Do we have any other discussion?

MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: I have a point of discussion. This is Tiombe. This is another happy thing. I was happy -- I had asked Stephanie to send me a list of the schools where, I guess parents related to the children who are serviced, but if I'm -- if this is the right resolution, and I think it is, I believe I saw two schools on there; St. Lawrence School and the Biltmore School, which I believe are private schools.

So I was very happy to see that, you know, the parents from, you know, in addition to public schools -- but we're also, you know, offering the children from private schools are getting services.

And then I also had mentioned to Stephanie, you

know, for the trust, and I'm sure you guys already are doing it, but also -- not to forget the children that are homeschooled and children that are in private school because in Dade County, the majority of the children definitely attend public schools, but some parents do decide to, you know, do something else.

And I'm guessing that if we did maybe a survey, you probably would see that maybe parents that decide to homeschool, maybe less of those children are involved in some of -- with some of our service providers and possibly private schools. I don't know. I mean, that may be something that needs to be looked at but I was thrilled to see private schools listed there.

Now, if we can get some homeschool co-ops and other things like that, I think that will be great, you know, just to remember that, you know, those parents and children matter too.

MS. WELLER: Absolutely, Tiombe. Any other discussion? Okay. All those in favor?

ALL: Aye.

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MS. WELLER: Any opposed? The resolution carries.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Okay. Thank you.

Resolution 2020-D. Authorization to negotiate and

1 execute contract renewals with Be Strong 2. International, Inc., Florida International University, and University of Miami to deliver brief 3 parenting workshops and educational or public health 4 5 events in a total amount not to exceed \$1,014,730 for a term of 12 months commencing August 1, 2020 and 6 7 ending July 31, 2021 with two remaining 12 month renewals subject to annual funding appropriations. 8 Α motion, please. 9 10 MS. GIMENEZ: So moved, Gimenez. 11 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: And a second? 12 MS. LEICHTER: Second, Leichter. 13 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. Are there any 14 recusals? 15 MR. BAGNER: It's like this is becoming a trend. Recusal, Bagner. Employed by FIU. 16 17 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Dan. Any other? 18 Moving into discussion, you'll remember Be Strong, 19 FIU, and University of Miami deliver parenting workshops and educational public health events. 20 This

It focuses on improving parenting practices through increased awareness and knowledge of ways that support child development. These are brief evidence-based parenting workshops delivered to a diverse group

initiative has now been dubbed the Parent Club.

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of primary caregivers across Miami-Dade County.

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The providers offer in person one session group parenting workshops or events that are universally available to parents and caregivers in multiple locations and multiple languages. The age ranges that we focus on here is prenatal through adolescents.

The Parent Club works in collaboration with the Children's Trust, Miami-Dade County Public Schools and the Department of Family Support Services. And while all three providers included inside this resolution are renewals, do note that Be Strong is recommended for a funding increase of \$100,000.

And you'll see a flyer and map included in your packet, and that map details the locations of parenting workshops that happened across the county during Q1 and Q2. Discussion regarding this resolution?

PASTOR DUNN: Yes. Dunn, through the Chair.

Richard Dunn through the Chair. I have a question and then based on the answer, I will have a comment. My question is, have any efforts been made to reach out to Florida Memorial University and Miami-Dade College, particularly the North Campus? And the reason --

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: I'm back.

MR. HOFFMAN: I guess it wasn't just me.

1 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: I was just texting you and 2 we're --

MS. BOHORQUES: No, it said someone started a different meeting and it kicked us off. Let me -- I'm going to find out what other meeting is scheduled.

MS. GRAVES: There may be another meeting possibly because I was kicked out twice. So I'm not sure what happened, but (inaudible) that may prevent some people from joining then we need to hold off. So, let's see if we can get back online and what happens.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Shanika, I didn't hear what you said, the second part.

MS. GRAVES: I said we needed to pause for a second. I had been kicked out twice and see if we're having any technical problems and if so, we'll have to reschedule the meeting because if we have technical issues we can't proceed.

MR. HOFFMAN: Okay.

MS. BOHORQUES: The only time the meeting was affected was this time. If you were kicked out other times it could be --

MS. GRAVES: Right.

MS. BOHORQUES: -- internet connection issue.

MS. GRAVES: Okay.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Can we punt to the staff for an answer?

MR. HAJ: Yeah. I'll ask Stephanie or Bevone but I know Pastor, that you're driving but we also have a map of where these services are being offered across the county. So we can forward that to you about where the services are because it's pretty spread out throughout the community. But Stephanie, can you directly respond to the Florida Memorial?

MS. SYLVESTRE: Yes. Bevone -- I don't know the details, if Bevone has done any as it relates to the parenting program. We've had conversations with Florida Memorial at a higher level with the president about greater partnership and access to their community and we're still trying to work -- those conversations are still in progress. Bevone, do you have a specific about this program?

MS. RITCHIE: Yeah, yeah. So I don't have specific information about those two entities that you mentioned. But just know that this is a universally available service. So we're providing services throughout the entire county, and as such, the north end is equally prioritized as all aspects of the

county.

So we can follow up and see where exactly we've had workshops. I personally have attended workshops in the north area, and our entity Be Strong has strong relationships with some of the cities in the northeast, particularly the city of Miami Gardens.

They've been working with Miami Gardens to engage and use the Parent Club as one of their programs that they support in reaching families who have parenting needs.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Bevone.

PASTOR DUNN: Okay. Can I can I just try to clarify a little bit more and I'm satisfied with the delivery of services where they're being offered.

I guess my question goes a little bit deeper than that to those who will be providing from an educational standpoint, the delivery of services. And that's what led to my question about Florida Memorial University as well as Miami Dade College North, in terms of them having an opportunity to participate in the delivery of those who will be delivering those -- the training and exposing the parents to that said training. I guess that's what I'm trying to ask.

MS. RITCHIE: Yeah. And so the only thing that I can add to based on your subsequent ask is that the

process for requesting workshops is open to anyone.

So we have a mechanism that anyone who wants to request a workshop can do so from our website. So at the parent club, you can request a workshop and we can deliver a workshop at any location that meets some minimum standards. The additional part --

MS. HANSON: Yeah. I just want to add on to what Bevone is saying. So -- because I think the Reverend is asking about how these entities might become involved in the vendor -- being vendors to deliver the Parent Club as FIU, UM, and Be Strong are currently.

PASTOR DUNN: Okay.

MS. HANSON: Is that correct, Reverend?

PASTOR DUNN: I'm sorry. I lost you. Could you

repeat the question? I apologize.

MS. HANSON: Sure. I was just trying to clarify if your question was more about how those entities might become involved as vendors delivering the parent club services like Be Strong.

PASTOR DUNN: Absolutely, because Florida

Memorial I do know has a component to their graduate
master's degree program in the area of education so,
you know, I was just particularly concerned if they
were privy.

I know that we make out -- we put out these RSVPs and different things, proposals, and a lot of times I don't know if they -- if an effort is being made out.

I'm not saying that they get special privileges, but sometimes I believe they may not be aware of such a great opportunity to even provide for their graduate students or for their students who might have an opportunity for some type of internship of that nature. So that's, that's my concern.

Of course, I'm somewhat satisfied with where the services are being offered. I believe that the Children's Trust has done an outstanding job in hitting those areas that are in desperate need of parenting. But I'm -- you asked -- you grasp what I

1 | was trying to --

2 MS. HANSON: Yeah.

PASTOR DUNN: -- say or articulate.

MS. HANSON: So -- right.

PASTOR DUNN: I want to know if they can be more involved in the delivery of those services.

MS. HANSON: I think we have a runway where we could, you know, start to think about that and maybe the first steps are the first phases are kind of what Bevone was speaking about in terms of bringing them in as partners to be host organizations, because both the student population and the staff population at an -- and in fact, I was just having this conversation with another board member about Miami-Dade College being a place where there's lots of parents that are students as well as staff. And so, that's a good place just to reach the audience that we want to reach so partnering them -- with them as host organizations can be a first step.

You can see in the resolution that there's two remaining renewals in this funding cycle. And this is another one of the -- we did this one separately because it was brand new. The last time when we put it out, just about a couple years ago or a year and a half ago, and this is one that will come into

alignment with the main parenting portfolio when it goes out for solicitation again, and so, you know, that's something where we could, you know, we could look at other options for people to apply to deliver the workshop.

- MS. HANSON: But I think the advisory group is for Book Club, correct? I mean, Stephanie, correct me if I'm wrong, but our community advisory board that we convene is around the Book Club.
- MS. SYLVESTRE: To my knowledge, it's only about the Book Club. I -- there might be some -- maybe there's a dotted line, but I don't think so.

in Boston, Massachusetts by integrating children's

books and advice to parents about the importance of

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reading aloud within well child pediatric visits from birth to five years of age.

This program is located in primary pediatric care settings in low-income high-risk areas and is designed to increase book access and literacy rich environments for young children and their families.

Reach Out and Read pediatric sites must serve populations comprised of at least half uninsured or publicly insured patients and is currently operating in 62 medical facilities. And you will see a map of Reach Out and Read locations included in your packet. Further discussion regarding Reach Out and Read?

MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: I had a point -- this is
Tiombe on discussion. I know it's something that I've
mentioned before, but I'll probably always mention it
when it comes to resolutions regarding children and
reading.

I just want to just make my statement about the importance of math and writing, but also as far as the literacy. We live in a community that is very language diverse and very language rich. And so, you know, I know that English is the dominant language as far as, like, learning to read in school, but I wanted to make my plug.

If we are really, as a society, culturally

sensitive, language is a part of culture, and I'm hoping in the future that, you know, for resolutions of what we're looking for, for providers that we're also looking to increase the literacy of children that have a native language that is other than English because we know if they're going to attend school in this country, they're going to get the English, but if their native language is something other than in English, they -- that should be developed.

2.

They should also have the opportunity to become literate in their native language especially, you know, some parents can afford to do this, some can't. But the opportunity should be there because literacy should not only be for English. If you're -- if English is not your native language.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Tiombe.

MR. BAGNER: My understanding is that Reach Out and Read, I think it says it in the resolution as well that they do bring in books in multiple languages. And really the effort from my understanding is getting pediatricians on board to promote reading to kids. So I think that they are.

I mean, I completely agree with the comments. I do think that the organization and the work prioritizes multilingual families, particularly

focusing on lower incomes and economically 1 2. disadvantaged families. MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: That's correct. 3 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Dan. All those 4 5 in favor? ALL: Aye. 6 7 MS. Hold on just a moment, please. Making sure I'm on the right one.

Yes, and this is part of a national, state, and local campaign for grade level reading. The Books For Free program ensures young children through age eight have access to books to take home and keep at no cost from bookshelves placed in 65 public spaces throughout the county.

Miami Dade College engages communities, business volunteers, in the public sector to collect, sort, and categorize gently used and newly purchased books.

This program also has a minimum annual 15 percent match requirement in cash or kind and resources from Miami Dade College. And MDC has provided more than 30 percent match in kind valued at more than \$126,000.

And you will also know that this funding amount for this contract is higher than the prior year because the upcoming contract term is for a 14-month period. The annual funding allocation remains the same.

And again, you will see a map of the Books For Free locations along with the Reach Out and Read locations including it -- included in your packet. Discussion from the committee?

PASTOR DUNN: Richard Dunn through the Chair. 1 2. MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Yes, sir. PASTOR DUNN: Well done, Children's Trust staff. 3 That's what I'm talking about. 4 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: 5 Thank you. MR. HAJ: Thank you. 6 7 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Further discussion? MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: I just have a point of 8 9 discussion that's probably similar to what I 10 mentioned. And given what Dr. Bagner, in his comments 11 for the last -- on his previous, I wanted to -- I 12 would take it back -- I just wanted to say maybe I 13 should -- I kind of like, I don't know, clarify what 14 I'm meaning is that I think this is a great 15 resolution, any of them that deal with reading and 16 literacy. 17 I just hope that in the future that we also 18 focus -- maybe I should have said it this way, that we 19 also focus on the literacy of children which English 20 is not their native language because culturally 21 speaking if you're native language assuming, you 22 should have the opportunity to become literate. 23 Meaning you could read Spanish, write Spanish, as well 24 as speak it the way -- how we're educated.

I think that is important if a family feels like

that. I had a long talk with Stephanie about this because I understand acculturation. I understand their levels of separation of family. Some families may choose not to and there are families that would want the opportunity for their children to become literate, fully literate in their native language.

So maybe in the future, the trust would consider, you know, that piece, you know, becoming more culturally sensitive that we're, you know, looking to provide services for parents that want to help their children to also become literate in their native language.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Tiombe. For the discussion? Hearing none, all those in favor?

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed? The resolution carries. Resolution 2020-G. And moving into discussion. This benefits enrollment initiative maximizes economic benefits for Miami Dade children and families with limited financial resources.

The initiative focuses on ensuring eligible families participating and other funded services are offered, benefits enrollment supports, including hard to reach families in place-based settings.

It is anticipated that in the coming months and year supports will include connection to any newly available public benefits related to the COVID-19 pandemic.

And this resolution seeks to renew six contracts to provide benefits enrollment services for families during the 12-month period. Each contract focuses on the region of the county to ensure county wide coverage. And as you can see, Vivianne has posted the map for us.

The full range of the programs, everything from SNAP to TANIF, low income energy assistance, discount phone, wireless and broadband services, and there are several others that are included inside your packet.

The Advocacy Network office supports quality inclusive programming for schools for children and youth with disabilities and their families, and they've done this for the trust for more than ten years; mostly focused on trust funded programs, providers, and for staff.

Based on a need's assessment with providers and parents of children with more significant disabilities and based on board input by way of an ad hoc meeting that was held last December of last year, the network will begin management of a flexible fund for direct use inclusion supports.

The intent of this funding, the funding for the supports, is to increase the participation of children and youth with more significant accommodation needs and trust funded youth development programs with their typically developing peers in a variety of areas.

So in addition to the management of this funding, the network will continue their past training and coaching supports for trust funded programs and staff and these organizational and in -- this includes site level inclusion readiness.

And then you will note again that the contract

amount is slightly higher because this is for a term of 14 months. The annual funding allocation remains the same. Do we have comments or discussion points from the committee?

MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: I have a comment. This is Tiombe. I just wanted to commend the board because I know -- I think another committee meeting, I mean, staff, because I think I -- we've mentioned in other meetings, the board and the committee that, you know, we wanted to also focus on children that have more moderate to severe disabilities because, you know, maybe some of the providers don't have adequate training on how to deal with some of the children who have more moderate to severe disabilities.

And you know, we want to have those children also participate. So I was very happy when I read this resolution and I just wanted to thank the staff for making this a reality.

MR. HAJ: Madam Chair, if I may?

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Yes, sir?

MR. HAJ: This is Jim. I do want to thank staff, but I do want to thank the board because this has been a topic discussed for some time. And when we convened this subcommittee, this is a direct result of what the ask was from the board subcommittee regarding

students with significant disabilities and how do we include them like Tiombe stated.

So this really is the direction of -- that the board gave us last year. It took us a little bit of time to get this thing going, but we're pleased to bring this in front of you.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. Further discussion? All those in favor?

ALL: Aye.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed? The resolution carries. Punting to you, Jim.

MR. HAJ: Madam Chair, thank you. I just have two quick updates. I think we talked about it, and we put it in the email, stayhome.miami, if you can visit.

We have Gloria Estefan who is a spokesperson promoting this trust website, as well as Romero Brito giving his artwork as coloring books, and a bunch of others who we are getting resources throughout the community and to continue to add to it.

So I'd appreciate if you go look, stayhome.miami, if you have not been able to do so. We will be -- we talked about emergency funding for PPE last board meeting, and we will be distributing a group of those to our health care clinic tomorrow. We'll be giving out the PPE.

And we have a bunch of other updates which I will include on the email that we send to the board every couple of weeks. But I do thank all of you for your time, for your leadership. And again, just thank you. I know how crazy it is for everybody, but for you to give your time is truly appreciated.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Jim.

MS. GIMENEZ: Madam Chair, may I say something?

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Yes, please.

MS. GIMENEZ: I would like to commend -- I did go on the website stayhome.com. It's awesome. I saw Gloria Stefan singing her song and your message Mr. Haj was amazing and your family. You all looked great on that video as well.

So I know that you guys are working very hard, the staff, and you can tell by the resources that you're putting up on the website, and I know that parents are accessing those and helping them tremendously, especially in this time and the needs that we have with the pandemic and how to deal with children.

I think it's important all the activities and all the strategies that you have been giving our parents in Miami Dade County. So thank you, to you and to the staff for a job well done.

1 PASTOR DUNN: Quick, quick, quick comment 2 through the Chair.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Yes, please.

PASTOR DUNN: I echo what has already been said and I was in the midst of pandemic house responsibilities from my wife. But I did hear the audio on the commercial and I was never so proud to be a part of the Children's Trust serving on the governing board and it was great.

I mean, I just want to compliment and commend to show that Children's Trust is being socially conscious to our community. And you know, there's no cliché that says, when the going gets tough, the tough get going. And that showed tremendous leadership and that's what has to emerge during these times.

This is not a time for us to scribble up and hide in a comfort place, a place of comfortability, but it's time to stand up and be counted, you know, with of course, some caution.

And so I was very, very pleased to see
Children's Trust somewhat on the front line in this
endeavor. Thank you so much, Jim, for your leadership
and to the staff and to the board as well.

MR. HAJ: Thank you. And the trust -- I mean, the board should be very proud of the staff. The

staff -- we have an amazing staff who's been working remotely and burning the candle at both ends.

And lastly, just the survey. We are putting a survey out to our community partners, all our providers, and it's pretty comprehensive. It will go out Friday, and we'll get the results back about how will reopening, when the time ever -- when the time comes.

How will it look? How can we best assist them in terms of IT needs, staffing needs, PPE; all of it. There's going to be a lot at play, and the staff has been working the last couple weeks to get this survey which is exceptionally comprehensive.

So we will try to get that report back to the board of moving forward and what summer looks like because we keep on talking about it as we open the economy. There's going to -- and people have to go to work. There's going to be -- there has to be places for kids to go from the early childcare centers to after school programs, and the summer camps, and how do we do that in a responsible way.

So we're working with all the partners and we'll be bringing you a comprehensive report, hopefully by this board meeting coming up.
