(Recording of the meeting began at 4:03 p.m.)

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MR. HOFFMAN: Thank you. Good afternoon.

Before we get into the business of the meeting, I'd

like to share a few remarks about the activities of

the trust since our last board meeting.

First, as you all know, the Trust has been very active over the past few months, both adapting the trust's own business model to the stay at home environment, as well as supporting our provider community.

Friday afternoon, our CEO sent an email that included a great summary of the activities undertaken to support our providers and our other community partners.

I'm especially proud of the leadership role that the trust and our CEO in particular took in any day account, childcare facilities, summer camps, sports camps and after school programs working group.

Recommendations of the working group had been incorporated into one of the mayor's emergency orders, and they lay out the path forward to reopening these important activities.

Also proud of the numerous initiatives we have undertaken throughout this challenging period to

financially support our providers, and to sustain and expand services throughout the community.

This includes providing the much needed funding to retain childcare staff, providing additional funding to family and neighborhood support, partnerships, and most recently distributing on June 5th over 360,000 items of PPE to over 120 service providers of our youth development and early intervention programs.

If you will indulge me for two minutes, I'd like to ask the -- we've received a lot of thank you's from the community for all that our staff has done to support programs. I'd like Vivianne if you can, to play a thank you note that we received from one of our providers. So maybe not.

MS. BOHORQUES: No.

to the Children's Trust.

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MR. HOFFMAN: Thank you to Hope for Miami.

Next, I wanted to briefly address the Ad Hoc

committee which has been formed to discuss

structural discrimination and racism as it pertains

We have been planning to devote a portion of our July board meeting to discuss the role of the

Children's Trust in addressing racism and

discrimination.

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Nothing has changed with respect to the need for this inquiry, except that the murder of George Floyd, other reasons and prominent acts of police brutality, racism, and the upwelling of protest have brought these issues into the forefront of our community's consciousness and made this self-examination by the Children's Trust that much more imperative.

And with our own community crying out for dialogue and for change, I felt that we needed to bring this discussion outside of our regular meeting format and create a forum where all of our directors who wanted to could participate.

I'm asked that Tiombe Kendrick-Dunn to chair the committee, primarily because she has been the most passionate among us in bringing issues of race and cultural competence to the forefront of our board discussions. This is not to diminish the role or efforts in our community of any of our other directors engaged in social justice activities.

Also, rather than handpick a select group of board members as we do for other committees, I urge all of our directors who are able and who want to provide input to attend and to participate.

Because of sunshine law restrictions, Tiombe and I have not had an opportunity to communicate or coordinate an agenda. But in my mind, there are several parts of the inquiry we should follow.

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These include examining the role of racism and discrimination in childcare outcomes, as well as determining what actions the children trust must take as a funder, as an institution, and as an agent for good in our community.

As members of the governing board of the trust, I think we owe it to our community to examine these issues now and to provide our wisdom, guidance and direction to management. I look forward to seeing many of you tomorrow.

Now we'll move on to the meeting. Muriel, is there any public comment?

MS. JEANTY: No, Ken. There's nobody commenting.

MR. HOFFMAN: I will now turn the meeting over to our secretary, Karen Weller for approval of the minutes of our last meeting.

As many of you 18 know, Michael has served since last year as 19 representative of the Miami-Dade County School 2.0 Student Government Association. 21 Michael, in addition to his dual enrollment at the School for Advanced Studies in Miami-Dade College 22 23 has been very active serving our community in various 24 civic leadership positions, volunteering a 25 significant amount of his time for the benefit of

others.

Michael, I hope this has been a rewarding experience for you, and we look forward to your future contributions to our community. Jim, would you like to say a few words to Michael? And Michael, we do have a statue for you, a statuette but it's not here on the phone.

MR. HAJ: Michael, the statue is in the mail.

But I just -- I am very -- I'm exceptionally proud of this young man. We've been communicating throughout the year and in the last couple weeks and his future is exceptionally bright.

I think those board members who are -- who have been with us for a while, his brother was on the board prior, he just has intellect, heart, compassion, everything we looked -- everything we asked for, he has it. And I'm just -- I'm excited for him to reach back as the years go by, just so we can track his progress.

So Michael, we are a phone call away. You're always part of the trust family but just know, this entire board, this community is behind you and thank you for your effort this last year.

MR. TORINO: Thank you. I greatly appreciate that and I'd just like to take a moment to say that

I've thoroughly enjoyed my position and it's been truly humbling to be able to participate with each one of you.

You folks are so welcoming and sharing and are so dedicated to the community and are just making Miami Dade County better every day, and I greatly appreciate that, so thank you.

MR. HOFFMAN: Thank you. Thank you, Michael.

And again, we appreciate your service. Is Emily

Rosendo with us?

MS. ROSENDO: Yes, she is.

MR. HOFFMAN: Okay. And can you speak up because we can then see your picture I think.

MS. ROSENDO: Hello.

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MR. HOFFMAN: Okay. Hi. So, Emily is replacing Michael as a board representative of the Student Government Association of Miami-Dade County.

Emily is currently an 11th grade high school student attending school for Advanced Studies. She's also pursuing, like Michael was, a dual enrollment at Miami-Dade College pursuing an Associate's in Arts degree.

She's maintained a 4.0 GPA throughout her academic career and has consistently distinguished yourself by helping others in her community,

accumulating over 700 community service hours. Emily is the Vice President for the School of Advanced Studies Student Government Association. She's also the Vice-President of the Miami-Dade County Schools District Student Government.

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Emily also takes part in community service projects such as beach cleanups, mental health wellness plans, and other community events in the town of Miami Lakes. Welcome Emily, and we look forward to your participation forward.

And finally, is Sandra West with us today?

MS. WEST: I am.

MR. HOFFMAN: Sandra, I believe you might have been -- you were introduced at the last board meeting, but I wanted to welcome you to your first board meeting as a representative of Miami-Dade County Council PTA-PTSA.

In addition to her role as president of the council, Sandra is also a mother of three children and a biology and research teacher at Hialeah Miami Lakes Senior High School. Welcome.

MS. WEST: Thank you. And now on the agenda, we were going -- we will turn this over to Steve Hope with the Finance and Operations Committee report.

Steve?

MR. HOPE: Thank you, Mr. Chair. Good afternoon, everyone. Happy Monday. First of all, you know, I think the success of any organization is contingent upon the quality of people that the organization has.

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And it's always important to recognize that the work that the staff, the CEO, and management the trust continues to do, has enabled the agency to continue with its vision and mission during this difficult time.

The Finance Committee met on June the fourth and we -- there were two key areas that was addressed. We had eight resolutions that was presented to the Finance Committee. The CEO And CFO presented the draft budget for the year 2020-21.

Without pre-empting what the CEO and CFO is going to present, I think two key factors must be recognized. The budget was a conservative budget taking into consideration, I would say two key mandates.

One, the responsibility to the community and ensuring that there would be adequate funding to fund programs in the community, while at the same time recognizing the agency's every possibility to taxpayers.

So without pre-empting, the information that the CEO and CFO is going to present, I would turn over to Jim to start the presentation on the proposed budget for 2020-2021.

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MR. HAJ: Steve, thank you. So -- well, while Vivianne's popping up the budget, I just want to let everybody, especially as we have new board members, what you're going to see in front of you today is the proposed budget.

This is in June. It went to the Finance

Committee. It's reviewed by the board. There is no action at this board meeting. It will come back to you in July. It will come back to the Finance

Committee. They will bring a recommendation to this board in July and at July we will vote, and whatever the board votes on in July will be what gets moved forward.

The book is advertised in the Herald and different avenues and not what -- that's what will appear on the TRIM which are scheduled for -- we have two dates in September that we have on your calendars that -- those are the TRIM meetings that they're scheduled.

So Vivianne, can you go to the next slide? So I want to go over some of the highlights here. So

since the beginning of this funding cycle as people remember, we are now a five year funding cycle which started in '18. October 1st is our new fiscal year of '18.

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The trust is currently committed an additional, besides what we were putting out, we've put an additional 35.1 million annually and 162 million over this funding cycle and additional funds are earmarked for program services.

This five year commitment continues to emphasize a portion of program spending that provides critical services to children and families in our community. This year, this upcoming year, we've also budgeted and the board has approved many -- this was on my -- the email that went out Friday from me.

The additional money in Parenting Early
Childhood Development. Many of these we're using our
current initiatives to respond to the Coronavirus and
to the community needs. Total budget of program
services 157,544,000.

As it relates to TRIM revenues and millage, the property appraiser report and assessed tax roll of 324,982,000,000, and the proposed millage rate before you that you will be considering that we're recommending is at .4478 which is a rollback rate.

So I want to just go over the definition of a rollback rate. A rollback rate is what the government -- that government is not increasing taxes. This is not a tax increase, even if the rate itself increases. That's because the rollback rate calculates taxable property values in relation to the total revenue they generate for a government.

If the tax rate generates the same total revenue one year as it did the previous year, then the rollback rate has been applied. The total TRIM revenues is 138 million.

So if you look at the total TRIM revenues, what we're bringing in 138, and what we're expending, there's a difference. We're expending more than what we're bringing in, and that's because there was -- for the last three years we have been working with the Finance Committee to develop a plan of action for using our fund balance and we have a five year --

We had a five year analysis and the plan that has been developed is on track. It is working and it is doing what it was intended to do with giving us the flexibility, and the rollback rate was part of this plan that in year three, we would be around this rate.

So, we're happy to happy to announce that the

rate is working and that we're very proud. Also, at the very bottom of this PowerPoint that the 2021 budget reflects management expenses of 6.23 of total expenses.

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This is an all-time low in the 18 year history of the trust. This is the lowest it's ever been.

And in trust history, this is the lowest management expense and the largest budget investment.

So this is the lowest expense rate we've ever had, the percentage, and it's also the highest amount of dollar for programmatic services that we have ever put out. So can we go to the next slide.

So, the next three slides, what you're going to see is what you're -- that's going to come in front of you next month and in TRIM.

So, the first page is Attachment A. And Attachment A includes the budget information that will be disclosed and advertised to the public. So in July, whatever the board has approved, this page will be put in the Herald and during -- and publicized throughout, so the public is aware.

So on this, you'll see the -- is the revenue section expenditures, the general administer, the GA, which is again at record lows, capital expenditures, total operating, and then the bottom is non-operating

expenses.

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You see an increase here, but this is nothing that we really control. This is the property appraiser, the tax collector, the CRAs and those fees we do not control. And then you keep on going down, and these are the total expenditures of the year. It would be 172,908,000.

So, on the next page, the second slide will be the fund balance and this is what the Finance Committee has been developing and discussing repeatedly for the last three years of how do we draw down our fund balance and that was the plan to put additional money out during this five year cycle and reduce the millage rate.

And the last page, this really brings it down to more a granular level that talks about where the dollars are at. So if you Look at the first part, the sustained expand direct services.

These are all our -- the strategic initiatives, and all throughout we have the increases which we have just -- have been talking about the last couple of months.

Community awareness and active awareness advocacy program and PVD, all that is that -- it's going to be the same as last year, all that is

| static.

And then you see the management of the Children's Trust. That has gone up a little bit, but that was with health insurance and there was a great increase in FRS rates this year from the state. And then non-operating expenses what we're talking about; the property appraiser, the tax collector, and others.

So those are the three pages that we will bring back to the Finance Committee in July but the real -- what will be approved in July are two different issues.

One will be the millage rate, which we are recommending -- the staff has recommended, and I believe the Finance Committee is in agreement that we go back to the rollback rate and the budget will come back in front of you. So I will open it up to Bill first. Did I miss anything, Bill?

MR. KIRTLAND: No, not really. And actually, it leaves me with very little to say. You know, maybe before there are any more detailed questions which we're prepared to answer as staff.

I mean, this budget comes to the entire board today after being vetted and thought through with our, you know, panel of experts that are included

within the Finance and Operations Committee.

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As Jim has already stated, the timetable for these, this information, is primarily for information purposes at this point in the month of June. Today, we will not be, you know, voting or having a motion for approval for this budget, but it can be a lot of information to digest.

So, we don't expect this information to change very much in between June and July. Historically, the information that's provided by the Miami-Dade County appraiser's office is relatively consistent between these funds.

So -- and in our close relationship and communications with the Miami Dade County budgeting offices it has actually given us a leg up and some -- a real advantage to developing this budget very early on.

Up until just a couple of days before our last

June Finance and Operations Committee, we weren't

absolutely sure what the Miami Dade County property

values would be for the year that we would be drawing

our revenue from.

However, what we had forecasted was very, very close to what they informed us it would be. But as we go into the future, some of the question marks and

long term planning and vision for the trust budget development is that we're going to make a flexible position as much as possible to deal with the uncertainties that may arise from fluctuating property values.

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We're not necessarily sure maybe what kind of effect the economic effect we can see happen in the coming years as a result of the COVID-19 and a lot of commercial properties potentially being vacant as a result of all this.

So we develop each budget every year making sure that we're developing a millage rate or requesting to adopt a millage rate that's nothing more than what's necessary, especially considering the reserves that we do have in place, but we are making sure that we're responding to community needs and putting additional funds into our budget windows needs are occurring.

So essentially, we have the potential to grow revenues in the coming years but we're being responsible, like, essentially how much of those revenues we request on a year to year basis making sure that we only are responding in a reasonable and full growth manner.

So as Jim said, we are on track to spending at

a rate that we had predicted and developed in the early years of this plan and essentially we're moving in throughout our funding cycle and potentially to the next funding cycle with the potential for growing each year as we develop more community needs.

MR. HAJ: Steve, that's it for our report.

MR. HOFFMAN: Did we lose Steve?

MS. JEANTY: We lost Steve.

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MR. HOPE? My apology. My computer crashed on me so I'm using my phone. All right.

MS. JEANTY: Okay. Good to see you back.

MR. HOPE: Can you hear me, I'm sorry?

MS. JEANTY: Yes, we can hear you.

MR. HOFFMAN: Yes, we can.

MR. HOPE: Okay. I may need some help. Can the vice-chair assist me? I just lost my resolutions. I'm rebooting right now. Oh, okay, it's on the phone. I'm sorry. Okay.

Resolution 2020-64. Authorization to renew services and execute related agreements with multiple II vendors in a total amount not to exceed \$1,921,101 for a term of 12 or 14 months with two agreements commencing on August 1, 2020, and all others commencing on October 1, 2020 and ending September 30th, 2021 and request a waiver of the procurement

1 | policy. Can I get a motion please?

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MR. TROWBRIDGE: I'll move it Trowbridge.

MR. HOPE: May I have a second?

MS. GRIMES-FESTGE: Second, Grimes-Festge.

MR. HOPE: Any recusals? Okay. If none, just before I open up this resolution to discussion, what I would like to add is that each year the accounting firm Deloitte normally puts out a white paper that looks at IT expenditure as a percentage of overall budget of organizations.

And for the 2020 white paper IT expenditures,

Deloitte indicated that IT expenditure ranges between
eight percent to about two percent of the budget with
a medium of about 3.65 percent.

The trust IT budget that is being proposed is just over one percent of our annual budget. So based on what is out there in terms of industry benchmark, the trust requests for IT expenditures is pretty much below that benchmark outlined in Deloitte's annual report. I will open up the resolution now for discussion for board members.

MR. HAJ: Steve, this is Jim. Have any comments on this?

MR. HOPE: Yes, sir.

MR. HAJ: I just want to highlight two things.

That -- one I mentioned the Finance Committee where I talked about it's hard to quantify our IT measures and the dollar amount that's saved, but two items that we change for IT solutions and in the last two years has resulted in our 1.1 million dollar savings.

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So, it really pretty much pays for itself where the 1.1 million went out to provide -- the savings went to put additional money into programs.

The second thing I really want to highlight that we've done this year is that we also have -- I do want to thank the IT staff for all their work that put us in a great position to pivot during the pandemic.

And just to remind the staff that we have an IT award winning department. We had Marty Munoz receive the Tech Innovation Award by special taxing districts for Florida this year, and our own Stephanie Sylvester, who runs programs and IT received the Florida Business Journal Magazine CIO of the Year.

And you have Sheryl who's a director of IT and a bunch of others who have really done some amazing work. So I thought this would be the best time to really acknowledge him during this reso. Thank you.

MR. HOPE: Thank you, sir. Any additional -- any discussion on this resolution? If none, all in

1 | favor?

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ALL: Aye.

MR. HOPE: Opposed? The resolution passes.

Resolution 2020-65. Authorization to execute a contract amendment with Merge IT to add additional funds for an amount not to exceed 20,000 for a new total amount not to exceed \$152,500 for term of 12 months commencing October 1, 2019 and ending September 30th, 2020. Can I get a motion, please?

MS. FERRADAZ: So moved, Ferradaz.

PASTOR DUNN: Second, Richard Dunn.

MR. HOPE: Thank you Any recusals? Before opening to the floor, this is an additional \$20,000 to meet the additional expenditures for IT, which will take the IP contract to Merge IT to 152,500. This amount is included in the request in the previous resolution for the 2020-2021. So, if new staff would like to add anything to this before we open it up discussion?

MR. HAJ: Steve, you just pointed out that we're asking for an additional \$20,000 for this year. This was the really -- the last piece for us working remotely was the ACH to make sure we get checks automated to our providers.

So staff still -- a couple of staff --

essential staff is coming on Fridays to still do 1 2. checks. Once we fix this, we can fully operate remotely. So this is really the last piece we need, 3 additional money to finalize it, so we're asking for 4 5 an additional 20,000. MR. HOPE: Thank you, sir. Any discussion on 6 7 this resolution? If none, all in favor. ALL: 8 Aye. MR. HOPE: Opposed? The resolution passes. 9 Resolution 2020-66. Authorization to execute a 10 service agreement with AT&T for internet connection 11 12 services in a total amount not to exceed \$27,759.20 13 for a term of 12 months commencing October 1, 2020 14 and ending September 30th, 2021. Can I get a motion, 15 please? MS. HOLLINSWORTH: So moved, Hollinsworth. 16 17 Second? MR. HOPE: 18 MS. DONWORTH: Second, Donworth. 19 MR. HOPE: Any recusals?

MS. JEANTY: Who moved first? Who moved?

MS. KOBRINSKI: Muriel, I have Hollingsworth

moved first and it was seconded by Donsworth.

MS. JEANTY: Okay.

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MR. HOPE: Before opening this resolution to discussion, you if those of you who would have read

the notes, it indicated that the trust has moved from a VoIP system to AT&T resulting in approximately \$67,000 in savings.

I will also open the floor to staff to see if you have anything you want to add before discuss among the board member.

MR. HAJ: Steve, just as I mentioned a Finance
Committee as we moved a couple of weeks before the
pandemic hit, we moved to Microsoft Teams and got rid
of all our office phones.

So we adjusted the contract so there was a cost savings of \$67,000 to make this move. So we're happy to bring the cost savings in. It really worked. The timing was perfect to move right before the pandemic hit, so now our primary mode of communications is Microsoft Teams.

MR. HOPE: Thank you, sir. If you could scroll to the next resolution, please.

MS. KOBRINSKI: We need to vote on --

MR. HOPE: Oh.

MS. KOBRINSKI: -- the resolution.

MR. HOPE: I'm sorry. We did not. I

apologize. All in favor?

ALL: Aye.

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MR. HOPE: Any opposed? The resolution passes.

However, due to a large amount of media buying that WOW does, we do get a great benefit in the -- amount of, and Ximena, I'm going to need you without a dollar amount. Was it 400 or 800,000?

MS. NUNEZ: 800,000 combined between the added value that we received from WOW and from Creative.

MR. HAJ: Yeah. So, it's 15 percent, but we do believe we recoup that cost and more from the added value.

We have some broadcast on TV and we also have print and radio as well.

Meeting June 15, 2020 Cultural Affairs, for cultural arts programs in an 1 2. amount not to exceed \$1,500,000.00 for a term of 12 months commencing October 1, 2020 and ending 3 September 20, 20-21. May I have a motion, please? 4 5 MS. GRIMES-FESTGE: So moved, Grimes-Festge. MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, and a second? 6 7 MS. NEIMAND: Second, Neimand. MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any recusals? And 8 moving into discussion, in 2019 the county awarded 82 9 10 grants for this funding that served 59,876 children. 11 It also exceeded 85 percent of its outcomes. 12 In the area -- in various areas and I do note 13 that the county has consistently surpassed the 100 14

percent match funding that's required as part of this contract. And you can see some of the major program areas as Vivianne's scrolling down.

Further discussion, observation from the board? Hearing none, all those in favor?

ALL: Aye.

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MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed? The resolution carries. Resolution 2020-73.

Authorization to negotiate and execute a match contract renewal with Miami-Dade County Department of -- pardon me.

Authorization to enter into a service agreement

with Miami-Dade County for a local funding match to support Miami-Dade Public Library Systems STEAM-based programming and academic tutoring in an amount not to exceed \$150,000 for a term of 12 months commencing October 1, 2020 and ending September 30th, 2021. May I have a motion, please?

MS. GIMENEZ: So moved, Gimenez.

MR. HOPE: Second, Steve Hope.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. Any recusals?

Moving into discussion, I'll provide a brief

overview. The trust partners with Miami-Dade County

Public Library System through a match project to

increase access for STEAM programming, especially in

marginalized communities.

The techno bus makes 60 stops throughout the community and this project also increased access to academic tutoring and provides 105 -- teachers. Mute your phone, please listeners. 105 certified teachers across 27 library sites.

The estimated cost of this project is a total cost is 936,000. The Children's Trust contributes 150,000 and Miami-Dade Public Library System funds the balance. And so, that's more than \$5 return on every trust dollar that's is invested. You can see all the library vocations and the available subjects

before you on the screen. Directors, discussion?
Directors, discussion?
MR. BAGNER: I have a question.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Yes?

MR. BAGNER: Yes. So, I was wondering, given the significant gender gaps in STEAM careers, I was wondering if there was any data on how many girls versus boys are participating in this?

MR. HOLLINGWORTH: Thank you, Daniel. Do you have a staff -- oh, Jim. Yes.

MR. HAJ: Yeah, Donovan?

MR. LEE-SIN: Sorry, I was on mute. We don't have many of the demographics in terms of ethnicity or gender for the program. Library to date has not collected that data consistently, so we've already talked to them about being able to do that for the coming year.

MR. BAGNER: Okay. Great. Thank you, Donovan. I think that would be important to measure in the future.

MS. HOLLINSWORTH: Thank you. Further comments, discussion from the directors?

MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: This is Tiombe. So, I'll just mention briefly. I think I mentioned it during the committee meeting but, you know, just to make

sure that, you know, if any of the students who participate or children who participate in this realm that the trust considers, you know, for those kids that continue to have interest or that may rise at the top.

Maybe somebody sees, like, they have, you know, an aptitude in math and science that's very high that there will be some kind of way to refer them on after this. I think that would be something that is important.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Tiombe.

MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: Thank you.

MR. HOPE: This is Steve Hope. Is there a way we measure how successful the investment is in terms of -- based on the amount of monies, accumulative amount of money spent between the trust and other sources, how is success measured for a program like this?

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Jim, do we have -- I know that there are some outcomes included with the backup documentation inside the packet.

MR. HAJ: Yeah. We have it up now on the screen. I'm not sure if you can see, Steve and I know you can ask Donovan to talk you through it.

MR. LEE-SIN: Sure, Steve. So, at the bottom of

each of these one-pagers, there's some data there related to the outcome or the influence of the STEAM program on kids and then at the one after that -- the page after that, there's a snippet from the survey.

So, all of the parents and students are surveyed at the end of the school year and so, we wait until grades come in and then parents are asked about the great improvement of the student over the year from when they started and when they ended tutoring with the program.

So, that data is forthcoming. Those surveys are currently out in terms of the effective grades and with regards to tutoring.

MR. HOPE: Okay. Thank you, sir.

MS. GIMENEZ: Quick question. This is Lourdes Gimenez.

MS. HOLLINGWORTH: Yes?

MS. GIMENEZ: Donovan, quick question.

MR. LEE-SIN: Yes?

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MS. GIMENEZ: In regarding what's up on this, the -- right now on the computer. The parents are the ones that are giving the information. Do we have the teachers, the tutors that are actually tutoring the children, are also surveyed as well?

MR. LEE-SIN: Yes.

MS. GIMENEZ: And do we --1 2. MR. LEE-SIN: And that's a part -- that's part of the data collection that happens at the end of the 3 school year, yes. 4 MS. GIMENEZ: Perfect. Thank you so much. 5 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, directors. 6 7 Further discussion? Hearing none, all those in favor? 8 9 ALL: Aye. 10 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed? The resolution passes. Resolution 2020-74. 11 12 Authorization to negotiate and execute a funder 13 collaboration contract renewal with Big Brothers Big 14 Sisters of Miami, Inc., (BBBS), in an amount not to 15 exceed \$62,500.00 for a term of 12 months commencing 16 October 1, 2020 and ending September 30, 2021. 17 have a motion, please? 18 MS. GIMENEZ: Motion, Jimenez-Herrera. 19 JUDGE PRESCOTT: Prescott, second. 20 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: And Judge Prescott second. 21 Are there any recusals? And moving into discussion, 22 this funder collaboration project supports the boys 23

-- the Big Brothers and Big Sisters Organization and its efforts to provide one-to-one mentorship and family support services and programs to 2,975 youths

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and families, and that includes children in foster care, children with disabilities, and children of parents who are incarcerated.

The evaluation and some of the indicators are included inside of your packet. 99.6 percent promoted to the next grade are graduating high school. 88 percent of youth improve academic performance. 94 percent of youth improve behavior, and 74 percent of matches reach the 12 month of engagement. More than half of -- in more than half reach their fifth anniversary.

And lastly, for the trust investment of \$62,500. And while a host of other funders invested 500,000 collectively, that resulted in a total collaborative investment of 562.5. So, for every dollar the trust invests in this project, \$8 are leveraged in return.

And you can see we are the nine contributing funders on the screen in front of you. Comments, discussion from the directors? Hearing none, all those in favor?

ALL: Aye.

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MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed? The resolution passes. Resolution 2020-75.

Authorization to negotiate and execute a funder collaboration contract renewal with Miami Homes For

All, Inc. to support partnerships to end youth homelessness in Miami-Dade County in an amount not to exceed \$100,000.00 for a term of 12 months commencing October 1, 2020 and ending September 30th, 2021. May I have a motion, please?

MS. GRIMES-FESTGE: Moved, Grimes-Festge.

MR. BAGNER: Second, Bagner.

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MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. Are there any recusals? And a brief overview as we move into discussion. Miami Homes for All coordinates systems partners to identify and track homeless youth and provide immediate access to appropriate programs and services.

The Miami Homes for All is a primary county-wide supporter agency for the helping our Miami-Dade youth collective also known as the HOMY Collective and that's a multi-sector effort to create a locally designed comprehensive system of care to prevent and address youth homelessness in Miami-Dade County.

This collective works with more than 100 agencies working collaboratively together to serve Miami-Dade County's youth experience homelessness.

2020 I-count survey indicated that there are more than 700 homeless individuals between the ages of 13 and 24 in Miami-Dade County. The Children's

Trust invests \$100,000 while the Homeless Trust invests \$360,000 in a fund collaborative investment totaling \$460,000.

Meaning that for every dollar the Children's Trust invests, approximately \$3.60 is leveraged in return. Feedback? Observations from the directors?

MS. JIMENEZ-HERRERA: I have a comment, Jimenez-Herrera.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Yes?

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MS. JIMENEZ-HERRERA: I want to make mention that it includes the LGBTQ youth. We know that is a community that experiences high rates of homelessness. They are thrown out of their homes when they come out for parents believe or find out that their child identifies as one of the members of the LGBTQ community. So I'm very happy that we are supporting this initiative.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. Further discussion? Hearing none, all those in favor?

ALL: Aye.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed? The resolution carries. Resolution 2020-76.

Authorization to negotiate and execute a match contract with Key Biscayne Community Foundation to support the Evidence to Success Initiative in a total

amount not to exceed \$50,000 for a term of 12 months commencing October 1, 2020 and ending September 30th, 2020. May I have a motion, please?

MS. GIMENEZ: So moved, Gimenez.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: And a second?

MR. HOPE: Steve Hope.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. Are there any recusals? And as we move into discussion, I'll remind you that the Evidence to Success Framework includes the engagement of community residents and decision making and action alongside agency leaders inside of Liberty City.

During this three year evidence to success roadmap, there was an allowance for a data driven partnership to understand better how children in Liberty City are doing.

And this also provides for the selection of proven evidence based programs to enhance strengths and address needs and to develop financing and action plans to support the ongoing use of the of these community evidence based programs.

Now in its third year, and the -- in this third year the evidence to success board has learned about preventative prevention, science and strategic financing, deepened its knowledge of the local

context and partner neighborhoods in participating public systems and related disparities, created a board structure and formed workgroups, and done a variety of other things.

During this upcoming contract year, the board will also focus on writing a vision statement, formulating key messages about evidence to success in neighborhoods in public systems, and begin fund max — fund map.

Key Biscayne Community Foundation is the fiscal agent providing in-kind services in the amount of \$50,000 for this effort, and MCI serves at the Miami Children's Initiative serves as the lead agency convening the public officials and community stakeholders.

The trust supports a site coordinator at MCI who convenes the numerous community meetings and manages the day to day work in this project. And in closing, for every dollar of the Children's Trust invest in the Evidence to Success Program, \$3 is invested by funding partners and you'll see the table is actually in front of you now in your packet.

Discussion from the board members, please.

Comments? Hearing none, all those in favor?

ALL: Aye.

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1 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed? The 2. resolution carries. Resolution 2020-77. Authorization to negotiate and execute a funded 3 collaboration contract with Key Biscayne Community 4 5 Foundation for the Fab Lab in a total amount not to exceed \$100,000 for term of 12 months, commencing 6 7 October 1, 2020 and ending September 30th, 2021. May I have a motion, please? 8 MR. HOPE: Motion, Steve Hope. 9

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: And a second?

MS. NEIMAND: Second, Neimand.

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MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any recusals? And moving into discussion, the Fab Lab is a mobile unit initially designed for communities as a prototyping platform for local entrepreneurship that educators use for project based hands on STEM based activities.

It supports the Liberty City Optimist Club, youth development programs that are also funded by the Children's Trust. The anticipated outcomes for 105 youth are 25 percent increase in the number of participants who see themselves in a STEM job or career.

A 20 percent increase in the number of participants will take more STEM classes in the future, and after completing the eight weeks of

curriculum, 80 percent of students will feel comfortable using the tools in the fabrication laboratory.

2.

You'll note that this complements the match that we voted on earlier with the Miami Dade Library System bringing stem opportunities directly to communities. There have been some modifications made in this program due to the pandemic, and although this project is on track with all of the deliverables including the delivery of materials, preparation of space, and hiring of staff, the trust invests \$100,000 while the Key Biscayne Community Foundation, Hyman brown and the Anonymous Foundation invest a combined total of \$364,320.

Which means, that for every dollar the Children's Trust invests in the Fab Lab program, the funding partners invests in the Fab Lab Program, the funding partners invest \$303.60. Discussion, comments from the board, please. Tiombe?

MS. KENDRICK-DUNN: Well, I'll just make the same comment, I think I mentioned it in the community -- I mean, in our committee meetings. For any of the children that participate and it seemed that there may be high aptitude rising to the level that the staff recognizes that we have opportunities or

referrals available for future opportunity of students that may have expressed high interest.

2.

I think I hand mentioned that, you know, it's really great to have programs like this which I think it helps students -- some students that may not be exposed to STEM-related programming, projects, but what happens, you know, when you just get a taste of something and then you cannot further explore your interests.

So, I just think in the future if not know, if it can't be done within the future where creating such wonderful proposals such as this, that we consider building in something that will -- let's take those students that, you know, may have a need, you know, that are interested, that they can go further than this because this is something that's not, you know, it's not going to last a long time.

And to me, it's just like allowing a child to get a taste of something and then you kind of maybe take it away.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Tiombe. Dan, did -- were you going to say something?

MR. BAGNER: Yeah. I also had the same comment as before. I didn't know if they had data on this, but again, I just want to highlight the importance of

1 making sure there are a lot of girls that are 2. participating in this as well as boys. 3 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. Further discussion from the board? Hearing none, all those 4 5 in favor? ALL: 6 Aye. 7 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed? The resolution carries. Funding from the trust for this MCI infrastructure support refers to the funding to support MCI's chief executive officer, director of programs, and their administrative system -- their assistant, pardon me.

This investment represents the sixth and the final year of funding for MCI infrastructure supports and for every dollar that the Children's Trust invests in the MCI infrastructure program, 100 and --\$1.98 is invested by funding partners. Discussion, feedback from directors, please? Hearing none, all those in favor?

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed? The resolution carries. And our final resolution for the day, Resolution 2020-79.

Authorization to negotiate and execute contract renewals with Training and Implementation Associates and the University of Miami, for program and professional development (PPD) support services for The Children's Trust's family services providers and staff in a total amount not to exceed \$583,334.00 for a term of 14 months commencing August 1, 2020 and ending September 30, 2021 with two remaining 12-month renewals. May I have a motion, please?

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you. Are there any recusals? And a quick overview as we move into discussion. Training and implementation associates in the University of Miami offer county-wide support — quality supports to 55 trust funded family service providers including group and individual parenting programs, family strengthening programs, and family and neighborhood support partnerships.

The ultimate aims of these supports are to achieve meaningful and measurable results for children, parents and families, and to consistently deliver high quality services in alignment with best practices, and to effectively and efficiently satisfy the trust contract requirements.

There have been some shifts in response to the COVID-19 pandemic and a number of virtual sessions were provided to keep service delivery consistent.

And finally directors, you will note that the funding amount for each contract is higher than the prior year's funding amount because the contract term is for 14 months in order to align with the Children's Trust fiscal year. Discussion, comments

from the directors, please? Hearing none, all those in favor?

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Are there any opposed? The resolution carries and that concludes the Program and Health Committee report. Back to you, Mr. Chair.

MR. HOFFMAN: Thank you, Pamela. I think we've actually gotten pretty good at these virtual meetings, but I don't relish the thought that this kind will do for the rest of our terms. So I do look forward to seeing everybody in person at some point. Jim, I'll turn it over.

MR. HAJ: Thank you. Mr. Chair, thank you.

Just a couple of brief updates and comments.

Financial disclosure forms from the board members are due July 1ST, so you have two weeks left for those of you who have not put in.

Muriel did send the email with a link. If you need us to send it to you again, please let us know but they are due July 1st.

The TRIM -- the two TRIM meetings are September 14th and September 21st. They're in your -- they should be in your calendars. If not, we we'll drop them into your calendars.

We need a quorum to vote for the budget that you

saw today. I know we reviewed the budget and it went by pretty quick. It's kind of hard to do it virtually. We will send it to you, and just like with every reso, those of you who want to take a deeper dive or to discuss it with us, myself, you can call me or Bill, and we'll be happy to go through the budget with you, but you will again be seeing it next month in front of you.

The Expo that -- normally coming up the next several months we have two things. We have Champions and Expo. So champions usually takes place in July, which is our award ceremony.

Obviously that will not be happening but we're looking at options how to do that virtually because we want we do want to recognize some unsung heroes in the community that stepped up the last several months.

And Expo, which is usually in September at the youth fairgrounds, where we have around 15,000 people come in, obviously will not be happening. So I just want to give you an update on those two events, and I think that is it, Mr. Chair. Thank you for the board. Thank you for all your support and I look forward to seeing everybody tomorrow.

And if you have not had a chance -- I know you spoke about it, Mr. Chair, at the beginning, but if any of the board members have not had a chance to read that email, do so because it really shows how our mission and the Children's Trust has been really carried out with perfection. That's all I want to say.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Well said. Very well said.

MR. HOFFMAN: Thank you. I agree completely,

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and I think that we can't thank our staff enough for
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     the extra efforts and the normal efforts, but the
     extra efforts that have gone into the trust, you
