PROCEEDINGS

(Recording of the meeting began at 3:22 p.m.)

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you very much and I'd like to welcome everyone to the April 2nd program's committee meeting, our program services and Childhood Health Committee meeting.

We have a few resolutions on our agenda today. A lot of business. Our last meeting was March 5th and certainly at that time we were all in the same room, and certainly never dreamed that just less than one month later we'd be meeting like this, and that we'd all be so good at it, as we collectively battle this insidious virus as a nation and as a world.

Before we proceed with the meeting, I'm going to punt to Vivianne and she's going to provide us with some protocols that will guide us during our meeting today.

MS. BOHORQUES: Thank you, Pam. I'm going to share my screen and then I'll share my screen throughout the meeting to show the agenda and the PowerPoint that we're going to go over.

So, this was a document that was shared to the committee members to the Board members this last week just to go over the protocol that we're going to follow. During the meeting, we just had an executive

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committee meeting, which some of you were on as well, and it went fairly smoothly using this protocol.

So, as you see, the video functionality is on for those of you who are members of the committee, or staff members or the attorneys that will be speaking, we ask that you have your video on.

If you are not speaking, if you can have your -the call on mute so that we don't have a lot of
background noise just trying to understand who's on
the -- in the meeting.

The committee members are attorneys and certain members of The Trust staff, our panelists. Those are the people that you are seeing. If you click on participants, you'll see them as panelists. The panelists can speak throughout the meeting and can engage in that way.

The attendees, sort of similar to how we would have an in-person meeting are listening and can see what is happening but are not able to speak during the public comments portion. We can see if anyone would like to make a public comment, and at that point we could give authority to speak.

Everyone -- yeah, is mute. The resolutions that flow to me will function similarly as a regular committee meeting. For the most part, the

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recommendation -- the recommended action will be read, then a motion and a second will be requested.

At that point, if you're going to motion or second you need to unmute yourself, state your name and your motion, then we'll ask for recusals.

If you are recusing, please unmute yourself, state your name, and the reason for the recusal. We'll open for discussion. There is a raise hand functionality if you click on participants. You'll see a raised hand functionality.

If you want to speak on an item in your panelist, please click that, and that way we can track who's going to speak. Pam can say your name and then you can unmute yourself and speak or -- yeah. See, Ken just raised his hand. We can see that. So, that way we cannot all be speaking at the same time and monitor that a little better.

Then once the item is ready for a vote, we will do it by roll call. Muriel will call everyone's name and you will vote yes or no at that point.

     investments.

          The results of each initiatives that you will be
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authorized today, the Key Five Program and the summer camps as well as the 6th to 12 grade school programs and their summer camps. Next slide.

Our K-5 grade after school programs and summer camps, and that's the Resolution 23A, provide a safe environment for children to increase their academic and social and emotional skills as well as their physical fitness.

The next slide? The last contract year, the Initiatives served over 22,000 children and funded 16 sites throughout Miami-Dade. (Inaudible) attached to both of the reso's behind and the reso depicts -- the map depicts how these sites have spread out in our county and some high need areas. Next slide?

Children participating in our program showed improvement on their literacy skills, as well as their physical fitness. So, if you see above on the slide, 80 percent of children improved their literacy skills, and 79 percent of the children improved their physical fitness. Next slide please?

And overall, their funding providers are on track to reach similar results for the current contract year. The first six months of program delivery have shown 85 percent utilization on average and our programs have served 21 percent of children with

disabilities.

And as you can see in the reso attachment, the majority of our funded providers are either advancing or mastering the areas measured by our program methods, and the reso attachment also includes these measures by assorted by provider. Next slide?

In our 6-12 after school programs and summer camps, which is Reso 2020-B, provide a safe environment for youth to increase academic and social/emotional skills while offering enrichment opportunities such as job training, coaching, sports and entrepreneurship's.

One more side too, please, Vivianne. Last contract year, this initiative, our 6-12 initiative served over 7,000 youth in 76 sites throughout Miami-Dade. There is again, the map attached to the reso depicting locations of these sites. One more slide?

And the youth participated in our program showed improvement on their attitudes towards academic success as well as their skills developed through the enrichment opportunity for our programs offered and you see the data indicated on this slide. And the last slide?

Overall, our funded providers are on track to reach similar results for the current contract year.

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Again, the first six months of the book program delivery for 6-12 have shown 93 percent service utilization on average, and our program served 26 percent of children with disabilities.

As you can see in the reso attachment, the majority of our funding providers are either advancing or mastering in the areas measured by our program metrics and the reso attachment also includes these measures by provider.

Madam Chair, if you -- I guess we can go into -- this tees up Reso-A.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Terrific. I'll start reading. Resolution 2020-A. Authorization to negotiate and execute contract renewals with 84 providers identified herein to deliver high quality after school programming for 12,712 elementary school children and summer programming for 13,204 elementary school children in a total amount not to exceed \$37,020,741.

Each term of 12 months, commencing August 1, 2020 and ending July 31, 2021, for a year-round -- ends for year-round and (inaudible) programs with two remaining 12-month renewals subject to annual funding appropriations. May I have a motion, please?

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Those are both put and then out by iSteep, and

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then for the fitness measure, we're using the Pacer which is the progressive aerobic, cardiovascularsomething relay. I don't have it in front of me, but it's a bonafide shuttle run.

And then we also have some -- a couple of choices of social emotional measures that programs can use.

Similarly, with our six through 12 programs, depending on the specialty of the program, we have identified standardized measures that providers can either -- they have to use or they can choose usually from a couple of options that we've already kind of vetted as reliable and valid tools within the, you know, areas of (inaudible), arts, job readiness, you know, whatever the specialty area is.

We have a set of standardized measures that providers can use, and I could provide you the list of those if you're interested in that detail.

And just, I don't know, some there's some cultural things. So, I've already -- I've met with Jim, talked to Stephanie so those are just my personal issues with it. I don't know if, you know, I understand the importance of the funding that we're able to leverage and what they offer, but I would hope like in the future which we could maybe look at various options or different options based on backgrounds of people looking at health disparities. Just a -- just, yeah. I'm just not -- just -- that's my opposition right now.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Exactly, exactly. Thank you. 1 2. MR. HAJ: Yeah, if I may just to (inaudible). This was out to bid right now. We are asking for 3 the waiver if they extend for the year just because of 4 5 the Coronavirus. Also, they have to work with the Department of Health and others partners which we were 6 7 not -- they would not -- no one could be able to reach the Department of Health or do anything differently to 8 9 put this out to bid. So, we thought it would be best 10 to extend it for one more year and put it out for bid 11 next year. 12 MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Thank you, Jim. Resolution 13 2020-D. Did somebody say -- oh. Thank you, Vivianne. 14 Authorization to negotiate a new contract renewal with Nova Southeastern University Inc. for program and 15 professional development support services for the 16 17 Children's Trust providers and staff in a total amount 18 not to exceed \$771,000 -- 950 -- \$771,956 for a term of 14 months commencing August 1, 2020 to September 19 20 30th, 2021 with two remaining 12 month renewals 21 subject to annual funding appropriations. The focus is on improving program quality standards and continuous quality improvement. Project Rise also engages in training, brief consultation and coaching so that providers can achieve fidelity to the core Children's Trust service requirements.

And also, there are some requirements as you've seen inside your packet which are unique to the K-5 and 6-12 student guidelines. Project Rise also supports group behavior management and also provides administrative support. Committee members is there discussion, observations, regarding this resolution?

MS. GIMENEZ: I just want to make an observation. It's Lourdes Gimenez, that I feel it's very important and critical for providers and The Trust staff to receive professional development as an ongoing basis, as so many things change in our areas especially in providing services to children.

And I really believe that this is an excellent way to make sure we do know that our staff members from The Children's Trust, go out and monitor the

programs and also offer school plans for improvement if they are struggling.

And I think that the professional development that is offered for them, it just enhances what they're doing with our providers and their staffs.

MS. HOLLINGSWORTH: Yes. Thank you, Lourdes. Further discussion, comments?

DR. The contract performance for this work has consistently met expectations and young children that have been receiving tutoring have improved in areas of oral reading skills.

He's done the pre and post testing, and I'm sure that the committee will have other comments or observations based on your review of this resolution. Hearing none. Muriel, I believe we're ready for the roll call.

MS. DUN: Oh, wait, I have it. I'm sorry. I guess you went out. I had a question. I wanted to commend The Trust also, like, for this program which I think is very important.

I think it helps children that struggle with reading to have continuity with some assistance. So, in regarding the afterschool because I think summer is definitely important, but to have the continuity.

So, you know, offering these reading supports during the school year, I think is important. Just hopefully, maybe in the future we might be able to

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increase the number of after school sites so we can make sure that these types of services are offered on a continuous basis without any gaps or very little gaps.

And then my other -- my question is, is the Trust maybe looking at something regarding math, tutoring, or tutorials, and maybe writing? Because although reading is extremely important, I don't think we on an educational level, forget about math and writing.

Math, I think as -- in general in this country, we are behind other countries, and even if you look at the curriculum and our district in Miami-Dade County, which I think it may be most of the Florida districts, while reading a lot of time is about 90 minutes to 120 minutes, which is an hour and a half to two hours, the standard curriculum usually in elementary school is an hour from now.

So, I want to encourage The Trust if, I mean, if it's already happening, that's fine but you know, when we're focusing on all these supports, reading usually eats up a lot of the funding even in school districts. But to remember math and to also remember writing because that -- the writing is extremely important as well.

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discussion, 211 includes a 24-hour staff cost that

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provides comprehensive information, referrals, crisis counseling services to support children, youth and their families in Miami-Dade County.

And the responses come by way of live communication as well as text messages. Services or responses are provided in English, Spanish, and Haitian Creole.

211 maintains a current and searchable database for community resources that includes more than 4,000 services and about 1200 community-based organizations.

And 211 also partners with Help Me Grow, which is a national statewide system to support children and their families who are at risk for health developmental and behavioral issues or delays in between the ages of birth and eight. Discussion, comments, from the committee, please.

DR. BAGNER: So, I have a comment and a question. I certainly support these efforts. What I'd like to know more of is the extent to which families follow up on referrals that are provided.

So, it seems like a lot of referrals are provided. Are families actually trying to pursue these services? Do we even have that data? And if not, I think it would be good idea to try to get that data.

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MR. HAJ: Before I turn over, I want Stephanie or Sabine to chime in. I also want to let the group know that we also help 211 with technical support to kind of allow them to work remotely.

They're all in one room, so we house 211. Other employees can also work remotely without missing a beat, so our staff assisted with that. Stephanie or Sabine, could you answer Dan's question? If we don't have the information we can get back to him before the Board meeting?

MS. DULCIO: Sabine D'Orsay with The Trust. We can get back to you on that one, Dan based on -- I do have Richard Shuters who's the director at 211. He's also on the chat Vivianne. I'm not sure if he can either make a comment to the question that Dan had.

MS. BOHORQUES: I can allow him to speak. Richard, if you unmute yourself you can speak.

MR. SHUTERS: Can you guys hear me okay?

MS. BOHORQUES: Yes.

MR. SHUTERS: All right. Hello, everybody. So, just to make sure that I follow the question correctly is to understand when families call in for different resources in the community to make sure that they're actually receiving the services and getting that help. Is that what the actual question was?

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DR. BAGNER: Yes, I mean, not. Yeah, I mean, with the understanding that a lot of the families may not end up pursuing services, but just information on -- excuse me -- whether or not they are following up with those referral recommendations.

I think that information will be very important to ensure that every -- we're doing everything possible or maybe think strategically about how to enhance the services to try to make it easier or more likely that families pursue services.

MR. SHUTERS: Okay, thank you for clarifying.

So, people might call for different services. For example, needing emergency food for their family.

Usually when someone does call in, we connect them with various resources. So, they can make sure that they get connected with food or whatever need they have at the moment.

In those situations when the counselors actually speaking with them, we're actually doing warm transfers and trying to connect them directly over to the agency just to make sure that they have that hand off to ensure they're seeking those services.

If for whatever reason they're not able to, from the resources that we provide due to either lack of funding or whatnot, we have them follow up with us so

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we can try to explore other options in the community.

We don't have data on every single caller to know every single outcome for every single call. I think that's something that would be great in regards to expanding to one in the future where you can have dedicated case managers or individuals that can follow up on a certain percentage of a vast majority of calls to know every single detail what happened after that.

I think that could be a great opportunity for an expansion of the 211 line in the future. So, I'm not sure if that answers your question or if you'd like, I can follow up with you with more details on some of those ideas.

DR. BAGNER: Yeah, partially. Thank you for that. I just have a few follow up questions. So, it sounds like for some families, there's -- the contact is made during the call. So, it sounds like they pit -- patch in the referral service and make sure that's set up.

So, I would imagine you have that data right in terms of keeping track of how many families call in and are given that warm handoff? Is that accurate?

MR. SHUTER: Yes. So, we collect that data whenever there's any type of enhanced advocacy done. For example, there may be agencies that we have a

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client calling in. They're speaking in Haitian

Creole, and that organization might not have a Haitian

Creole speaker.

So, we'll get our Haitian Creole counselor to speak to the agency and find out when would they have that service available so what we can do to best assist them in the community.

Or if they require situations of crisis where if we need to follow up with someone just to make sure that they're safe and okay, that kind of falls in another aspect where we're checking in with them. So, a lot of it is on the actual call where we can connect them with the other agency.

Now, sometimes we get calls back where the person might say, "Well, you know, I went to this agency, they mentioned to me that they're not going to have funds for the rest of the year because they're exhausted."

So, when we get that information, we make sure we're updating our own database to make sure we're not giving that same referral again, understanding that as funds are exhausted in the community, and then we're also connecting them with other options that may be available for them at that time.

DR. BAGNER: So, would you be able to provide us

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with, like, percentages that, you know, what are the -- how many of -- how many calls come in? This is the X percentage or, you know, this handoff is done or -- and/or, you know, how many families call back and say the referral that you provided didn't work out? Like, do we have any of those numbers that are being kept track of?

MR. SHUTER: We have the numbers of enhanced advocacy when we're doing that specialized connection going up and beyond just a regular call. In terms of data of specific of their calling back just to give an update, we are not tracking that at this moment.

DR. BAGNER: I think that would be, at least for opinion, it would be important to keep track of that. I suspect every call that comes in there's notes that are taken on the call. So, it doesn't seem like it would be that much extra effort to make note if this was a call that had come in previously, and this is a follow up call.

MR. SHUTER: I'm thinking one of the questions we do ask is, how did they hear about us? We can reconfigure that to say, "Well, I heard about you because of X, Y, or Z, but this is actually my second time calling or my X amount of time calling within this past week for this particular need, and then we

can take a look at that to keep track of those 1 2. numbers. 3 DR. BAGNER: That would be great, and if you could provide the data at some point before the Board 4 5 meeting of those handoffs, how often that's -- what 6 percent of the time that's occurring, that would be 7 helpful. MR. HAJ: Thank you. I kind of want to give a brief update to the committee of what The Trust has been doing (inaudible) now, what we plan on doing, and it's going to get worse before it gets better.

So, I want to share The Trust has always been here for the last 18 years for the children and families and during a tough time, The Trust needs to take the lead and be there to support this community.

As many of you know that we are operationally -we are fully operating remotely, and it really has
been the leadership of this Board the last three years
as well as with our IT and data team that we were
positioned very well to do so.

Before the decision in three weeks before the Coronavirus hit, we removed all our phones. We were working with teams. My phone was the last to go. I was kind of holding on to it as long as possible. So, we were positioned well, so all our staff is working remotely.

Bill and I, our CFO comes in once on Friday just to sign a couple of checks, but we are fully operational and everyday our Departments are meeting. They're meeting together. We meet as an executive

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committee and the leadership of The Trust Executive
Team meets every morning

And we also have a line of work with our providers. You know, it's a great time of confusion and uncertainty, so we are working with our providers.

We have a FAQ and we continue to keep up to date, and we have -- we had an all-staff meeting yesterday just a 20-minute check in.

We're going to have a larger, an hour-an-a-half meeting next week, but this was really just to see how the staff is doing, give them an update on what we're all doing because different departments are doing different things to make sure that they know that we as the Board appreciates them and the leadership appreciates them.

We are going to schedule also a provider town hall meeting so we can kind of get -- there are common themes we need to address, we can address it, and we can also use best practices. We have providers doing some very creative things with this with online learning.

So, we're going to use that platform to kind of work with our providers community to see how we can get through this. Innovations -- these are -- these were cancelled. Well, the Innovation Fund wasn't

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cancelled. It was suspended and two were cancelled and that's why the two reso's you saw today were the Help Me Grow and the meals that we just extended for one year and then we'll roll out the solicitation later.

With our providers, we have we have supported them, you know, they are going through difficult times and our providers hire some of the people that work with our providers in -- the childcare industry are the lowest paid workers.

So, we thought it was important for them to trust vision and mission is to continue supporting them.

When we talked to the executive team about this, we have committed to supporting them through April 30th, and we will continue to monitor the situation and get the leadership of the Board of where we go from there.

We also extended the 60-day audit. We had an audit, so we asked them if we give them a 60-day audit extension. And we're providing technical assistance to our providers who are trying to do the remote online touchpoints with the community as well as also the backend office work that they have to do for us.

The finance team is also getting guidelines around invoice submission and reimbursements to get to them, and the research team is also putting together a

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set of guidelines regarding data collection because as you saw the data in front of you today, we want to make sure that we don't -- we accurately reflect our data and not skew that, so the research team working on that.

I talked about the virtual town hall meeting.

Our provider bulletin has been repurposed, so instead of general stuff it's just issues and topics that relate to the challenges and the resource available.

There's a lot of resource coming down regarding the CARES Act, the Payroll Protection and other things which we're trying to navigate through and be able to give it to our providers in an easy digestible way because it is a lot coming down.

We authorized -- we talked about the executive committee at our school-based health. We had 150 schools -- close to 150 schools with medical expertise in there as well as mental health. We repurposed those and schools are closed back to their organizations and now they're doing virtual work with the school system on mental health and physical health.

We're -- the checks -- again, nothing is missing a beat. The checks are going out. We're working on our incentive program for the early childcare centers.

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We actually -- Rachel and I were in the office last Friday and we went to hand deliver a check to one of the early childcare center workers, and she was just appreciative to The Trust.

But I think as a community, we've been getting emails and calls from our provider and the community to thank the Board for the support that they have given.

In communications, another piece of what we're doing is trying to get out there and give messaging and support as much as we can. So far, we've done -- it was 16. We did one more today, television, radio, print ads in the Herald, NBC-Six, Telemundo, Channel 10, and we are -- and we're doing different types of press release recreating the landing page for parents and caregivers to get the most information on The Trust and what our partner agencies and government and nonprofit sectors are doing.

One of the things that we're doing too, is that you know, yesterday was -- we've been doing a big push with the census while people are home. We don't want to take our eyes off the census and have people -- so I hope everybody who is on this line if you can reach out to your networks and just encourage people to complete the census.

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The newsletter also has been repurposed for critical need and content and we're increasing the amount of information that's going out. Again, try not to throw all kinds of information, but just what information to people who need the help and highlight some of the creative things our providers are doing.

We have seen a big uptick in our web page as well as our social media for the last couple of weeks.

That means most like the community is looking us -- looking to us for different types of information.

And we're about to launch a micro website in the next couple of days. The last two weeks we've been working on it to have valuable information resource for parents who have their kids at home, to help them navigate the disruptions they are facing, and we're also trying to work -- I think it was yesterday or the day before, with leaders in this special ed or students with disabilities to get resources, but those parents are at home with students with disabilities and how can we help them.

The communications team is working out to reach out to The Trust funded providers, and I think every everybody in this organization is going beyond to try to do what is best for this community which is to meet the needs.

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We again -- we talked about the census work that we're doing, and I think most importantly, we're trying to work through this. But this is a time that we need to work and partner with others. We do not want to be going down one path.

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So we've been partnering with the heads of organizations for about 15 to 20 of the lead agencies, with the funders, with the chamber, with the Beacon Council, with the county, with the hospitals, and kind of talking about who's doing what, so we're not reinventing the wheel and how do we work smart through this.

So we've been having joint calls on Fridays and we also do that, you know, talk about funding The Trust and the emergency and -- working with the emergency funding procedures in the procurement work of Board chair and helped United Way start their pandemic fund to help individuals at need in the community for food and other emergency essential personnel, essential functions, and half a million dollars was given to join The United Way campaign I believe. I know Mary's on the phone -- on the line, but I think there are over \$2 million with all the other organizations pitching in too.

We -- with Actors Playhouse, you know, we have

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Young Talent Big Dreams coming up, and we pivoted that as well. Auditions are taking place virtually. So, let's see what we get. We may have an increase in the number of people who are participating. But I, you know, with executive -- I had Bill chime in.

I'm not going to have him do it now for sake of time, but there really was a leadership of our Chair or Finance Chair and the Board about -- financially we are in a very good situation to type one pivot.

We are not in a very difficult position. We built this model, not anticipating these specific prices, but hurricanes or things will come and we need the flexibility and we have built the flexibility into our finances.

So Madam Chair, I just really do want to thank the Board, the executive team. We've been reaching out to many of you, but thank you for leadership during this time. It means a great deal to us and it means a great deal to this community.
